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What have I learned recently about initiating fruitful questions for myself?

I think that there are two sources: a primary source that sets the big questions that occupy one for a life-time; and a secondary source that brings to light the subordinate questions, even hierarchies of subordinate questions, that serve to articulate the big questions.

The big questions come from the psyche as conceived by Ira progoff and Robert Doran. In 1920 I was sent to England to do philosophy at Heythrop College and to prepare a degree at London University: in 1927 I wrote the Canadian provincial asking that my field of study be shifted to general methodology; fortunately I did not do methodology at London; but ever since I have been preoccupied with working out my own ideas on the topic. Again in 1927 I had to preach in the refectory; I had taken as my text some parallel to Acts 28, 20; "You may hear and hear but you will never understand; you may look and look, but your will never see." I was advised by the superior that, while my doctrine was true, it would be better not to preach it. (But the idea has remained fruitful; it becaus "inverse" insight in the book, Insight, dislectic in Method in Theology, sin as a surd in Grace and Freedom.

The secondary source is interesting people and interesting books, that is, people and books whose interests approximate to one's own or complement them. How does one find theM? One may attribute the finding to research, or to luck, or to emergent probability, and ultimately in any case to divine providence.

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To what am I responding in the world as it is now? What is the current question for me?

From 1930 to about 1944 I spend a great deal of my free time on economic theory eventually producing a 120-page MS which, it seemed, either was an aberration or at best ahead of its time. In the spring of 1976 I began investigating the possibility that times had changed: there was a graver awareness of unsolved problems; the dominant neo-classical school was being criticized by a Cambridge group; the notion of a radical scientific development had been set forth by Thomas Kuhn in the field of physics and transposed to economics by Brian Loasby (Economic Journal 81 1971 803-885). I feel fairly well set to conduct a seminar on a seminal idea next term at Boston College.
